Conduct by any student that adversely affects a school's climate or operation, including disruption of the learning environment, shall be considered a breach of the District Code of Conduct, warranting appropriate forms of intervention that may include suspension.

## School Dress Code:

A dress code was established and implemented at Harry Sayers Elementary in January, 2004. Students, parents and staff worked together to determine the dress code requirements for all students who attend our school.

The dress code for students consists of the following:

- Navy blue dress pants / jumper or skirt for girls / dress short in appropriate weather
- White polo shirt or dress shirt or white blouse.
- Navy blue sweatshirt and/or navy vest
- Navy or white socksGym strip consists of a plain red t-shirt and navy shorts.  
This gym strip is required for all students in grades **4 to 5**.

Hats and outside shoes are to be removed upon entering the building. Coats and outside footwear are to be stored in the areas provided.

## Care of Personal and School Property:

Students are expected to respect school and personal property, equipment and resources. Student work areas are to be neat and tidy. The school and grounds are to be clean and litter free. Gum chewing is not allowed at school.

## Bicycles, Scooters, Skateboards, "Wheelies"

Students are welcome to use these items to arrive at school but shall not use them on the school grounds. Helmets must be worn prior to arrival and while on school grounds.

## Extra-Curricular Activities:

Students are considered to be ambassadors of Harry Sayers Elementary when they are participating in extra-curricular activities and field trips. Consequences for misbehavior will result in disciplinary action in one or more of the following forms:

- Discussion of the incident with a supervisor
- Removal from participation in activity
- Immediate return to school
- Further actions upon return to school
- Exclusion from subsequent activities

Tobacco, alcohol, vapes, and/or illegal drugs are not permitted on school grounds. These products are dangerous to students, as well as being illegal. Possession of these products will result in firm disciplinary actions.

## Statement of Purpose:

### At Harry Sayers we will:

- Establish and maintain a safe, caring and orderly environment
- Protect students from discrimination (race, gender, religion, sexual orientation) as outlined in B.C.'s Human Rights Code

## Human Rights Code:

- Assist each child to feel safe, both physically and emotionally, in the school and on the playground.
- Build and maintain a set of positive norms, behaviors, attitudes and values that determine how individuals act and interact with others.

- Help students to recognize that respectful behaviors will impact on their career, lifestyle and future.

**Conduct Expectations:**

At Harry Sayers Elementary, it is expected that all members of the school community will:

- Respect the rights of others
- Respect the health and safety of others
- Respect the property of others
- Respect the school rules
- Follow the Guiding Stars of our school
- Behave in an safe, ethical and lawful manner

Expectations for student behavior are presented at the beginning of each school year and are reinforced throughout the year. In order to assist students to achieve school-wide expectations, a variety of support systems are in place at Harry Sayers Elementary. These include:

- Review of the Code of Conduct
- School based counseling and multicultural support from the district
- Assemblies to celebrate accomplishments
- Star awards for positive behaviors
- Contact with parents for escalating concerns.

**Unacceptable Conduct:**

Any conduct that negatively impacts upon the learning environment may be subject to discipline. The following behaviors are deemed unacceptable. This list includes examples of unacceptable behaviors and is not intended to be all-inclusive.

Behaviors that:

- Interfere with the learning of others
- Interfere with an orderly environment
- Create unsafe conditions

Acts of:

- Bullying or threats
- Physical violence
- Retribution against a person who has reported incidents

Illegal acts, such as:

- Theft of or damage to property
- Possession, use or distribution of illegal or restricted substances

- Possession or use of weapons

**Consequences for Misbehaviors:**

When addressing misbehavior, staff will discuss the incident with the student, referring to the Code of Conduct, and allow the student to explain their behavior. As students mature, they are expected to take on more responsibility and self-discipline, leading to increased consequences for repeated misbehavior. Whenever possible, consequences will be restorative rather than punitive, with an escalating series of consequences for continued inappropriate behavior. These include:

- A think paper and discussion
- A written warning
- A follow up with parents or guardian
- Referral to school based team and/or district personnel
- Action under District Regulations and/or School Act

Special consideration may apply to students with special needs, who are unable to comply with expectations due to having a disability of an intellectual, physical, sensory, emotional or behavioral nature.

The staff of Harry Sayers Elementary will continue to ensure that positive behavior is given recognition. Our goal is to help students see that they are responsible for their own behavior. The choice for cooperative, positive behavior is with each student as he or she strives to meet or exceed social responsibility expectations.

**Minor Offenses:**

Staff members will deal with minor offenses as they occur. Students will know that they exercised poor judgment in that particular instance. They will review the behavior that is expected from them in the future. Parents will not necessarily be contacted for minor offenses unless a pattern of repeated offenses occurs.

**Major Offenses:**

Major offenses are those behaviors which threaten the orderly function of the school or well-being of others. These behaviors can include open defiance, physical or mental abuse of others or continuous disruptive behaviors.

Major offenses will be handled through a formal process. In such situations, open communication will occur between the teacher and/or administration, the parent and the student.

A plan of action will be decided upon, discussion by all parties concerned and acted upon. The consequences for major offenses will be decided for each individual case.

**Notification:**

Depending on the nature of the offense, the appropriate people will be notified. This list may include: parents of the offender, parents of the victim, school district officials, police and/or other agencies as required by law.

**AP 345: Student Use of Personal Digital Devices in Schools**

**Background:** The District sees the potential of new technologies to enhance learning by enabling students to create digital content, communicate, collaborate, and access educational tools. Regulated use can also improve safety and security. However, unregulated use may pose risks to personal safety, disrupt instruction, invade privacy, and compromise academic integrity. Personal digital devices include cell phones, smartphones, tablets, smartwatches, and portable video game systems. Hours of instruction are defined as the time students receive instruction.

**Students:**

- Devices should not be used during instructional hours or school activities without permission.
- Devices should not be used in private areas like change rooms or washrooms.
- Elementary students should not use devices during breaks.
- In emergencies, devices should be put away or turned off during lockdowns.
- Students are responsible for the security of their devices.

**Teachers:** Some students may need to use devices for medical, health, or accessibility reasons during instructional time.
